Your mother


will not mind at all if I do.

I know of would do!






The bee hummingbird is so tiny, so small.


It's just two inches long.


That's the smallest of all.


And its wings beat so fast that they hum when it flies, and the eggs that it lays are just...
















And...

like some cats that I know.







Some birds that you see love to glide through the sky, while other birds stay on the ground and can't fly.

And these shy little birds like to stay out of sight and search for their food in the dark of the night.
















When birds want to go

Wild geese are quite good at this trick, as you see. They fly off in a flock in the shape of a "V."


But the bird up in front gets the wind in his face and must soon take a rest, so a friend takes his place.

Then the lead goose falls back, has a rest, and starts gliding on air waves his other goose friends are providing.




Oh, look at the time!

You will see what I mean.

















## GLOSSARY

**Freedom:** The opportunity to think, act, and speak as one pleases.


**Lagoon:** A shallow body of water usually attached to a larger body of water.
