



my good looks," he said to himself.




The ice broke!

"Hello?" he said.


No one answered.


The eggs were all alone.

I'll take care of you!"









Ellie caught the egg with her trunk.

"I'm so sorry," he told the egg.






"Their mother must miss them," Ellie told him.

"You should return them."





The next day, the eggs hatched.

They were dinosaurs!


The dinosaurs were already very big.


They had sharp teeth.

Her teeth were sharper, too.






Momma was glad her kids were home, but she didn't like Sid.

At bedtime,


Momma helped Sid into his nest. She picked him up by his fur.

Sid knew he didn't belong.


He loved the dinosaurs,

"You're where you belong," Sid said.


"You'll grow up to be big and tall,
