







Their hair can be hard like this small hedgehog's spines or the dangerous quills on these two porcupines.






Mammals live on cold mountains and hot, burning sand,






They can hop, jump, and swim or glide high on the breeze.





















When a mom armadillo has babies, you'll find she has four. They're all boys or all girls—just one kind.
















The polar bear, walrus, sea lion, and otter spend most of their time in their home in the water.








A mother bear snuggles

the same time each year.








Anteaters never can find time to play.

They have to eat thousands of ants every day.




You may think that cheese is what mice like to eat, but they really like seeds such as corn, oats, and wheat.



Omnivores, we do recall, like meat and plants—they eat it all!





Now here is the question

### **GLOSSARY**

**Breach:** To leap from the water.

Carnivore: An animal that eats mostly meat.

Herbivore: An animal that eats mostly plants.


**Hibernation:** A deep state of sleep during the winter.

**Mammal:** A warm-blooded animal that has a backbone and usually fur or hair and whose babies are fed with milk from their mother's breast.

**Omnivore:** An animal that eats both meat and plants.

Pygmy: A tiny person, animal, or thing.

**Quill:** The hollow stem of a feather; the sharp, stiff hair of a porcupine.
