



What is the story about?

When Tom asks Danny, Melody and Rashid if he can play with them, they say no at first. But then he shows them how well he can whistle so they let him become number 4 in the order of their group. This means he has to do what the others say, but as they are playing, they first lose their football in a garden, then their kite in a tree, and finally their sailing boat gets stuck in the middle of a pond. Tom then uses his amazing gift of whistling to charm the birds so that they get back the kite and the boat. He then charms the fierce dog in the garden while he safely retrieves the football. The other children are so impressed they decide not to have an order of seniority in their group anymore – they are all number 1.

Talk together

Look at the cover and read the title together. Ask, "What do you think the story will be about?" Look through the book together, focusing on the illustrations, and identify the characters and where it takes place.

Read the story

- Encourage your child to read the story aloud to you, and join in with the enjoyment.
- Praise your child when he/she notices that something doesn't make sense while reading and corrects him/herself.
- If your child misreads words, ask him/her to reread the sentence and check it makes sense, but don't let your child struggle for long or the sense of the story may be lost.
- Encourage your child to notice the punctuation of spoken words, and to read with expression, e.g. raising voice tone at the end of a sentence with a question mark, and emphasising when there is an exclamation mark.
- Occasionally, ask your child what is happening in the story to check he/she understands.
- Praise your child for attempting new words and making sure the words make sense.
- At the end of the book, ask your child what he/she enjoyed most about it.


"Show us," demanded Danny.

"Suits me," agreed Danny. "OK. You can be number four, Tom."


"What does that mean?" asked Tom.

"It means," explained Rashid, "you have


to do everything we tell you."


"But when we've all got coughs and have to stay home," added Melody, "you can be number one."


"Great!" exclaimed Tom. "Thanks."












Tom sighed. Then pulling himself up to his full height and shaking the worry out of his head, he ran along and through and round and up to the front door of the large, white house.

Suddenly the wind dropped. The boat stopped curving gracefully along. Four sad faces stared at it drifting slowly round and round in the middle of the pond.






"My whistle," said Tom.


"What's the use of your whistle?" Rashid said.

They rolled a large rock up to the garden fence. Danny and Melody climbed on it and peered over. There was the ball, right near the fence.




"What about the monster dog?" Tom asked.


"Asleep," Danny said. "If we lift you over the fence, you can grab the ball and then we'll pull you back again."
